ASIAN FILMS ARE GO!!! 2003 FESTIVAL

CELEBRATING ASIAN HERITAGE THE SUBWAY WAY

In honor of Asian Pacific Heritage Month, the wacky folks at Subway Cinema offer the Asian Films Are Go!!! 2003 festival.

Films from Korea, Japan, Thailand, Taiwan, and India grabbed the spotlight this year. Korea's Double Agent (2003) is a potent mix of political intrigue and character study. Han Suk-Kyu (*Shiri*)



returns to the big screen after a muchlamented three-year break. Playing a North Korean defector who arrives at Checkpoint Charlie after scaling Namsan Mountain. Han shines as a tortured soul who may or not may be a spy for North Korea. What follows is a tour de force performance as well as a sleek film that is reminiscent of thrillers such as The Third Man and The Ipcress File. Korea can also do horror with the best of them. The Phone (2002) bests The Ring (the original Japanese version and




its creepy visceral images and a little girl (played by Eun Seo-Woo) who unleashes sick hell on her own family after being possessed (think The Exorcist's Linda Blair with an incestuous agenda).

Japan's Bounce Ko Gals (1997) is a twisted funhouse of Tokyo's kogyaru (schoolgirl hookers) while *Ping Pong* (2002) delves into the kinetic world of championship ping pong. This is not simple movie about hitting that little white ball across a wooden table; instead it confronts themes of isolation, jealousy, and bravery in a surreal whirlwind of poetic images. Hong Kong's So Close (2002) boasts the hot Shu Qi (Gorgeous, The Transporter) as one half of an assassin sisters duo. Directed by the great Corey Yuen, this is what Charlie's Angels should have been, complete with high kicking stunts and sapphic wanderlust. Killer

Tattoo (2001) from Thailand is a one-of-a-kind detour into the over-the-top world of hitmen and prostitutes.

Never taking itself too seriously, Tattoo is pure delight and guilty pleasure rolled up into a smorgasbord of sweaty action and sensuality.
